Staffing

Whilst staffing has remained fairly stable throughout the session, at this time of year we are in the process of securing staffing for August. We will be saying goodbye to both of our newly qualified teachers (NQTS) at the end of term, Iona Henderson (P1H) and Alasdair Palfreyman (P4P), Sarah Williams (P3W) and Sophie Conley (P2C) who has job shared with Claire Campbell. Rachel Mackay (P7R) is awaiting placement following the centralised recruitment drive. Felicity Martin, DHT, who joined Trinity in November made the decision to leave CEC due to ill health. We wish them all well in the future.

Rebecca Boath is continuing to receive treatment. She is hoping to return to Trinity in August with a view to retiring in September. Claire Nisbet is now on maternity leave and Annette Baumann has taken up post of temporary clerical assistant. Katie Berry will be leaving at the end of June – an advert for the post of administrator is currently live.

We will be saying goodbye to Krystie Henderson, one of our PSAs, at the end of term.

Facilities

Work is now well underway on the replacement of the classroom although the weather has resulted in the completion date being extended. I continue to be very grateful to all of our school community for their understanding with the situation as it is challenging. Noise, dust and lack of space are the biggest issues. We are now beginning the process of relocating classes and resources as all Trinity learners will be back on site come August. This involves a lot of planning and consideration as we aim to minimise disruption. As part of the project the temporary staffroom will be decorated and carpeted from the roofing budget and reinstated to being a classroom. Haddens have been appointed the contract to replace the kitchen roof – work is due to start in September.

Budget

Ipad pens for P5 – P7 classes have been purchased and are being put to good use. The carpeting of one classroom has been put on hold until the Oct week. We are looking to improve the communal area between the entrance hall and early yrs corridor with the introduction of study and reading areas. We remain within budget for staffing.
